## **NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH PATROL INSTRUCTIONS**

- WHEN POSSIBLE, PATROL WITH A PARTNER. This is not only a safety measure but also provides an additional witness and assistance in case of trouble.
- 2. TRANSPORTATION. Walk drive or both, depending upon weather conditions and coordination with your assigned partner.
- 3. SCHEDULE. Any hour of the day or night is acceptable and appreciated.
- 4. ROUTE. Stay within your neighborhood and the areas you are most familiar.
- REQUIRED EQUIPMENT. Carry at least one (1) flashlight per patrol during nighttime hours. If driving, affix the magnetic car sign to your vehicle. If walking, wear a reflective vest to identify yourself. Patrol logbooks or pads and pencils should be carried.
- 6. PATROL UNARMED. FIREARMS AND WEAPONS ARE STRICTLY PROHIBITED. Remember that we are the eyes and ears of the community and Sheriff's Office, not a vigilante group.
- 7. <u>REPORTING</u>. If it looks suspicious, report it. If you suspect criminal activity, observe a crime in progress, or see evidence of a crime, one patrol member should contact the Sheriff's Office immediately, identify yourself, the watch group and provide assistance if possible to do so safely.
- 8. AVOID VERBAL AND PHYSICAL ENCOUNTERS AND DON'T ATTEMPT TO DETAIN ANY PERSON AGAINST THEIR WILL. This might not only be dangerous, but a violation of their civil or legal rights. (Remember eyes and ears only)
- TRY TO IDENTIFY VICTIMS/WITNESSES AND URGE THEM TO FILE A
  FORMAL COMPLAINT. Many crimes are never reported, remain unsolved,
   or offenders are not punished because people refuse to get involved.
- MAINTAIN "HIGH VISIBILITY" DURING PARTOL. It's just as important for potential lawbreakers to see us as it is for us to see them. Our aim is protection, not a high arrest records.
- 11. <u>ALWAYS PUT SAFETY FIRST</u>. Unnecessary heroics are out of place on patrol.

## Florida Statute 843.20 2015

843.20 Harassment of participant of neighborhood crime watch program prohibited; penalty; definitions.-

- (1) It shall be a misdemeanor of the first degree, punishable as provided in s.775.082 or s. 775.083, for any person to willfully harass, threaten, or intimidate an identifiable member of a neighborhood watch program while such member is engaged in, or traveling to or from, an organized neighborhood crime watch program activity or a member who is participating in an ongoing criminal investigation, as designated by a law enforcement officer.
- (2) As used in this section, the term:
- (a) "Harass means to engage in a course of conduct directed at a specific person which causes substantial emotional distress in that person and serves no legitimate purpose.
- (b) "Organized neighborhood crime watch program activity" means any prearranged event, meeting, or other scheduled activity, or neighborhood patrol, conducted by or at the direction of a neighborhood crime watch program or the program's authorized designee.
